General Update

Hello Everyone,

As a sponsor of GOAL Digital Academy, one of the requirements is to collect data from stakeholder groups over the course of a school year. One of the stakeholder groups I recently collected data from was the students at GOAL Digital Academy. They were asked to complete a survey, with a total of 672 responses completed. This represented approximately 83% of the 804 active students enrolled at GOAL Digital Academy as of December 21, 2022. The sponsor wanted to obtain information on how students felt about the school. The results of the survey will be shared with GOAL Digital Academy's superintendent, and in turn, she will share the results with her faculty.

Below is a summary of the survey results, which are rounded to the nearest whole number. The actual graphs as well as comments made by the students are attached to this newsletter.

Legislative and Policy Updates

After what some may consider having been a bit of a dysfunctional beginning to the 135th General Assembly, the Ohio House of Representatives got to work during February. Leadership appointments and committee assignments have been made. Over 60 bills have been introduced for initial consideration by the Chamber.

The two most important committees in both chambers (the House and the Senate) for K-12 educators are likely the **Education** (Primary and Secondary Education in the House*) and the **Finance** committees. The House **Primary and Secondary Education Committee** will be led by Representative Bird (Chair), Rep. Fowler-Arthur (Vice Chair), and Rep. Lightbody (Ranking Member**). Rep. Bird has a long history of service as a public-school teacher, building administrator, and superintendent. Prior to being elected to the Ohio House, Rep. Fowler-Arthur served on the State Board of Education. She was home educated. Rep. Lightbody has many years of service as a public-school teacher and college level instructor. The House **Finance Committee** is chaired by Rep. Edwards. The Vice Chair is Rep. LaRe and the Ranking Member is Rep. Sweeney. The Finance Committee is divided into several subcommittees focused on areas of the Budget. The **Subcommittee on Primary and Secondary Education** is chaired by Rep. Richardson with Rep. Isaacsohn serving as Ranking Member. Senator Brenner is Chair of the Senate **Education Committee***. Other senators helping to lead the Committee are Senator O'Brien (Vice Chair) and Senator Ingram (Ranking Member**). All three leaders bring to the Committee experience in the field. Senator Brenner has previously chaired this committee. He holds a Master of Education degree in Curriculum and Instruction with a focus in Leadership. Senator O'Brien holds both a bachelor's degree and a master's degree in Education. She has taught at both the elementary school level and at the college level. Senator Ingram brings to the Committee over 20 years of service on the Cincinnati Board of Education. She is a former member of the Board of Trustees and Executive Committee of the Ohio School Boards Association. Unlike the House Finance Committee, **Senate Finance** does not have subcommittees. Committee leadership includes two very experienced legislators: Senator Dolan

Recently Introduced Legislation

Ohio House

Although over 60 bills were introduced into the House during February for consideration, many of the proposals relating to primary and secondary education represent a reintroduction of bills that were considered during the 134th General Assembly but did not complete the legislative process prior to the sunset of the 134th. For instance:

HB-12 reintroduces the idea of creating a new department under the Governor, the Department of Education and Workforce, that would assume most of the responsibilities of the current Department of Education and the State Board of Education.

HB-9 reintroduces Rep. Lightbody's proposal to create the *Grow Your Own Teacher Program*.

New Proposals Introduced for House Consideration

- **HB-33** The Biennial Budget. As you might suspect this bill is quite lengthy, even the LSC analysis of the bill is well over 300 pages. The analysis of the provisions related to primary and secondary education may be read on pages 84-106.
- **HB-38** seeks to give schools permission to grant students up to three mental health days per school year. A doctor's excuse would not be needed, and the time missed would not be considered in the calculation of hours of absence for the purpose of parental notification. Once a student uses a mental health day, the school may refer him/her for appropriate school support services. Schools could prohibit the use of a mental health day on certain days, such as when standardized testing is being conducted.
- **HB-46** seeks to require educators to report their district/school of employment when applying for their license. In the long term, ODE would be required to develop a system so that educators could annually report this information.
- **HB-47**, if enacted, would expand the availability of automated external defibrillators (AEDs) and the people trained to use them. Schools would be required to develop a plan for the use of an AED (or adopt the plan that the Ohio Department of Health will be required to develop).
- **HB-11**, if approved, would eliminate the EdChoice Scholarship program, and direct the State Treasurer to open special savings accounts for eligible students funded with state money. Funds in these accounts could be used to pay for tuition, purchase textbooks, access to tutoring services, etc.

In the Senate

SB 17 seeks to require the ODE to develop standards for the instruction of concepts related to "free market capitalism" and incorporate those standards into the model curriculum related to financial literacy. Certain concepts, such as the forms of private ownership of capital, market prices and supply and demand, and free market societies and political/personal freedom, would be required to be included.

SB-49, the Religious Expression Days (RED) Act, if enacted, would compel schools to grant teachers up to three days of leave per year for "sincerely held religious beliefs."

- * While the House has separate committees for the initial consideration of proposals related to primary and secondary education, and higher education, the Ohio Senate has a single committee that initially considers proposals related to education (Pre-K-16/20)
